Students need to know the definitions for the following vocabulary words:

<u>civility</u> being polite and treating people with respect <u>dependability</u> reliable; responsible; people can count on you <u>trustworthy</u> showing people they can trust you through your words and actions <u>honest</u> telling the truth <u>explorer</u> someone who travels to find new things and places

<u>COlONY</u>- a settlement in one country that is ruled by a different country <u>COlONIST</u>- someone who lives in a colony

The students need to know the following about the founding of Georgia.

- James Oglethorpe was the leader of the English settlers.
- James Oglethorpe named Georgia after King George of England.
- Savannah was the first settlement in Georgia.
- The first settlement was built next to the Savannah River.
- Tomochichi started the village of Yamacraw Bluff. It was on a bluff next to a river.
- Tomochichi wanted the English to treat his people fairly.
- The Yamacraw taught the English settlers to grow crops for food.
- Tomochichi thought it was important to learn the language of the English settlers.
- Tomochichi is remembered for keeping peace.
- James Oglethorpe asked Mary Musgrove to help him communicate with the Creek.
- Mary Musgrove owned a trading post.
- Mary Musgrove could communicate in English and Creek because she lived in an English settlement and a Creek village when she was growing up.
- James Oglethorpe, Tomochichi and Mary Musgrove helped found Georgia.
